Bovigen Scour

There are currently supply issues with Rotavec Corona vaccine, we have been using Bovigen Scour (an equivalent product) for over a year now with very good results.

Cows are vaccinated just once in the last 12 - 3 weeks of pregnancy. Antibodies against Rota Virus, Corona Virus and E-Coli scours are then delivered to the calf via the cows colostrum.

These are major causes of scour in calves and often controlling these 3 bugs makes other bugs such as Cryptosporidium less likely to take hold.

We have handy tests that can be done on farm to identify these causes of scour – results in just 10 minutes.

Ubroseal

There have been a number of issues securing reliable supplies of some medicines over the last 18 months. One particularly challenging area has been ensuring a consistent supply of teat sealant.

Shepton Vets has been in discussion with Boehringer-Ingelheim, manufacturers of products such as Metacam, Ubro Red, Ubro Yellow and Bovela BVD vaccine, and we have successfully secured a long-term arrangement for their teat sealant Ubroseal.

This will enable us to have a consistent supply of high quality teat sealant that is identical to our previous product.



Farmer Focus:

Graham Weeks has a very special herd of pedigree Holstein cows. The Hensbridge herd consists of 140 of some of the largest dairy cattle in the practice. Beautiful, powerful animals that really look like a herd of cows, these animals are a pleasure to work with. But what is so special about this herd? Cows are milked twice a day, fed a full TMR (no parlour cake) and at the last recording cows averaged 37.95 litres of milk, fairly spectacular yields for twice a day milking.

Performance within the Hensbridge herd has gone from strength to strength over the years but this winter it has been the addition of a new mastitis vaccine that has had a number of benefits.

The decision to use this vaccine was entirely farmer led. Graham was at the Dairy Show last October and stumbled across UBAC, a Strep. uberis vaccine that Hipra were just about to launch. We had not done any recent milk sampling to determine the cause of mastitis in this herd but we presumed Strep. uberis would be prevalent as the cows are on straw yards. Keen to avoid the hassle and cost associated with mastitis Graham wanted to give this vaccine a try.

Mastitis rates on this farm had always been higher than we would like in the winter months. The straw used for bedding cannot always be stored inside meaning often damp straw is used – perfect bug food! Graham didn't want to waste any time and was keen to get the 3 doses in before the main mastitis

risk period (December – March). The initial course was completed by mid December and already things were starting to look good. We treated 1 case of mastitis in December compared to 11 the previous



year. There have been 10 cases of mastitis from December to the end of March. During the same period last year 43 cows were treated.

These results have far exceeded all expectations including those of Hirpa that claim you will see a 50% reduction in clinical Strep. uberis mastitis rate. As for the increased milk yields there has been a new nutritionist on farm, excellent quality forage was made last summer and I think less disease has played a big part. Graham says 'The best bit about all of this extra milk is that it is going into the tank and being sold'.

Well done to the whole team at Manor Farm.
